- Starting June 10th, bring your swimsuit and towel everyday!








#### **Preschool Picnics**





#### It's simple, but it's not easy

It's simple to know that children need a combination of love and limits. The part that is tougher is actually setting limits (boundaries) and then following through. Have faith in yourself that you can do it. You can be loving, even on those days when kids test your patience. You can set



limits and follow through. Doing the right thing isn't always easy, but it's worth it in the end.





#### Therapeutic Value of Drawing

From "The Hidden Meaning of Kids' Shapes and Scribbles", by Isabel Fattal

"For many kids, drawing is exhilarating not because of the final product it leads to, but because they can live completely in the world of their drawing for a few minutes (and then promptly forget about it a few minutes later). Adults may find it hard to relate to this sort of full-body, fleeting experience. But the opportunities for self-expression that drawing provide have important, even therapeutic, value for kids.

Even simple scribbles are meaningful. While it was once thought that kids only scribbled to experience the physical sensation of moving their arm along the page, 'now it's been shown that when children are scribbling...they're representing through action, not through pictures,' said [Ellen Winner, a psychology professor at Boston College who also works with Harvard Graduate School of Education's Project Zero, a research group that focuses on arts education]. 'For example, a child might draw a truck by making a line fast across the page and going "zoom, zoom", and so it doesn't look like a truck when the child is done, but If you watch the process, what the child says and the noises and motion he makes when he's drawing, you can see that he is trying to represent a truck through action,' she said. 'And in a way you have drawing fused with symbolic play.'"

#### What Happens to Spoiled Children? Maryln from ATI

I was on an airplane going to do a talk. When the airline stewardess heard what I was going to do, she got really excited. She said, Tell them never spoil their children." She then went on to tell me that she was in her early 20's, and her parents had always spoiled her, given her everything she wanted. She said that they even gave her a credit card, and they paid all her bills. She shared with me that when she turned 21, they cut her off, and told her it was time to make it on her own. She said that her life was miserable. She took he "spoiledness" into her relationships and expected everyone to do things for her. She said she was struggling now to work, to pay her bills, and to learn a new way of acting. I told her I would share her story. Help children by giving them a framework in which they can learn to be responsible. Give them little jobs to do so they learn the satisfaction of a job well-done. Stay in charge. There is a sense of security knowing that there is someone in charge who cares, someone who is consistent, and cares enough to say "No" when that is needed.
